Last September, on behalf of the Franklin County Fiscal Court, we were awarded a federal grant through the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. In the past year, we hired our first full-time staff and expanded our programming and services to families.

# **OUR VISION**

Our vision is to disrupt recidivism and end the cycle of incarceration by providing the children, youth and families we serve with a pathway of hope and empowering them to be seen and heard without fear or judgment.

Kentucky has the 7<sup>th</sup> highest incarceration rate in the world.

Kentucky's incarceration rate is 40% higher than the national average.

On average, children of incarcerated parents are six times more likely to become incarcerated themselves.

# 40% of children in Franklin County live in Single Parent Families

On average, there are 184 county inmates that are incarcerated in the Franklin County Regional Jail. Of those, 70% are parents.

# WE KNOW THAT INCARCERATION AND TRAUMA IMPACT OUR KIDS.

Developmental diversions and delays, learning disabilities

Trauma can alter how we think, feel and process information

Uncertainty/instability of a parent being gone

Stigma/embarrassment/shame of having a parent incarcerated

Financial difficulties

Difficulty building attachments

Uncertainty about the justice system

Loss of family, home, safe place

Hyper pursuit of acceptance

7 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

We focused on caregiver support by offering Parent Cafes, parenting classes, support groups, and more. On average, **SEVEN** caregivers and parents receive weekly mental and emotional support.

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### 8 FULL/PART TIME STAFF

We hired staff and moved into our first office!

We contracted with **TWO** parenting class instructors to lead an evidence based curriculum specifically designed for incarcerated parents. This year, we held **FOUR** graduations inside the Franklin County Regional Jail.

**SIX** seniors were awarded the **Adam Hyatt Memorial Scholarhip** in the amount of \$1,000. Twelve of our high schoolers graduated from high school this year.
