FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

December 2023, the director of Thorn Hill Learning Center scheduled a meeting with me to discuss a new family literacy program. Three days prior to that meeting, I visited the Boys and Girls Club in Barren County. Conversations began in October 2023 about the need for a club in Frankfort and I wanted to visit a thriving program. The site visit was remarkable- seeing children get off the school bus with smiling faces, happy to arrive in a safe, structured after school environment. The club provides academic support, multifaceted learning opportunities, a hot meal and positive, caring adults. BGC's motto, "great futures begin here" was certainly exemplified throughout the building.

Little did I know the plan that would unfold. I attended the meeting at Thorn Hill with two WJRF staff accompanying me. As soon as the meeting began, I interrupted Kelley Anderson and said, "WJRF needs to move into Thorn Hill and we are going to start a Boys and Girls Club." Without a second to pause, her immediate answer was, "Okay! Let's go see the basement."

Since that December conversation, WJRF is moving full steam ahead with expanding and increasing programs and services to families. A big goal we have this year is to connect with 150 people to join us as a Sustainer- a commitment of \$300 or more per year for five years. Since 2018, we have prayed for "the right people to show up at the right time" to help us accomplish our mission. More than 800 children in Frankfort, literally a high school building, need assistance. More than 800 Frankfort youth have been impacted by incarceration. To put that into perspective, the total enrollment of students at Western Hills High School is 868.

In a 30 day period, approximately 374 children have a parent incarcerated in Franklin County Regional Jail. This is a conservative number as it does not include children with parents in the state prison system.

The foundation has received no major gifts, over the amount of \$10,000, with the exception of one from Justice Action Network, who donated \$50,000 in 2021. This allowed us to be in a position to apply for a federal grant, which is reimbursable funding only.

Kentucky has the 7th highest incarceration rate in the world.

Kentucky's incarceration rate is 40% higher than the national average.

On average, children of incarcerated parents are six times more likely to become incarcerated themselves.

Frankfort, Kentucky is one of two state capitals in the United States without a Boys and Girls Club. Frankfort was identified in 2012 as a desired site for a club.

The Wanda Joyce Robinson Foundation at the Boys & Girls Club of Frankfort will leverage essential resources from the nationally recognized BGCA to provide a safe and nurturing environment for Frankfort's youth. This collaboration aims to foster growth and resilience in our community's young people.

COMMUNITY

In spring of 2024, we moved our office to Thorn Hill Education Center. This partnership has allowed both of us to expand programs and resources such as Alateen, Family Literacy, Classes, Family Support, Events and much more.

RELATIONSHIPS

We are ending 2024 with 50 mentors matched in our *Amachi* program. Mentors spend one hour per week (or more) with their assigned mentee.

We know that these relationships can make a huge impact on our youth.

RESOURCES

Through an amazing partnership with Just Say Yes and grant funding, we were able to provide more than 350 of our kids with a ^{\$}400 Yes Card in 2024. A Yes Card is an electronic gift card that can be used to pay for youth activities from a list of approved providers in Franklin County. It is part of Just Say Yes, a youth wellness and substance use prevention initiative that encourages positive support for young people in Franklin County.

COLLABORATION

Wanda Joyce Robinson Foundation is working with our partners to bring a *Boys and Girls Club* to Frankfort in 2025. This national model offers a safe place for youth to go after school and on school breaks to ensure healthy habits and brighter futures.

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We opened up a Ky Saves 529 account. Starting out, we have listed **ten** beneficiaries- kids of fathers who are participating in our FatherHood Re-Entry group. They each have ^{\$}250 in savings that will be given directly to a secondary institution upon their high school graduation and enrollment in college or career certification program.

Locals Food Hub and Pizza Pub provided food boxes every other Friday for Wanda J families. Volunteers and staff delivered boxes to our families as needed.






According to the 2024 Franklin County Youth Survey, our kids (CIP) have made significant improvements within one year as related to their peers (NON-CIP). In the areas of mental and physical health, social connections, and nurturing (all of which are protective factors for mitigating trauma) our kids showed major gains as compared to their peers.

Youth survey is given annually to Franklin County students, 7th-12th grade.




CIP: CHILDREN WITH INCARCERATED PARENT NON-CIP: PEERS
